

Narrabri Downcast Vent Shaft Project

New South Wales, Australia

The Narrabri Downcast Ventilation Shaft Project kicked off in early June, with site mobilization completed within a month.

Along with being our first coal project in New South Wales, it is our first time ever sinking a shaft into an active underground coal mine, and our first raisebore in coal. A large market is present within the coal industry for safe, efficient shaft sinking.

Actual works commenced on July 4th, consisting of piling to a depth of 25m to provide a support for the 5m diameter raise bore hole to be pulled through from underground at a depth of 318m.

Mobilization of the sub-contractor piling equipment broke site records for site approvals, with the piling drill being approved for use within 2.5 days from arrival on site.

Piling was achieved 10 days ahead of schedule, enabling steel works for the raisebore pad to begin early.



550m of piling completed in 11 days (22 x 25m each at 1050mm diameter.) All piles are within specifications, with no measurable vertical variance in any pile. Centre of piles was excavated to 4.0m from surface (RL 339.5) to enable a Client directed 40MPa concrete ring beam to be poured.

Thank you to all the Redpath Brisbane Plant Yard and Head Office staff as well as the Perth Raisebore Division for their assistance in a very successful start to the Narrabri Downcast Ventilation Project, in amongst the start-ups of several much larger projects.
